If you are a UK taxpayer, please Gift Aid it too. The chancellor has made it even easier to stretch your giving. The Gift Aid scheme means that if you have paid enough income tax on what you give, Christ Community Church can claim that tax back from the government.

Gift Aid means the church will get the tax you paid on your giving at no cost to you. A £100 gift is worth £125 to the church.

If you pay Income Tax at the higher or additional rate and want to receive the additional tax relief due to you, you must include all your Gift Aid donations on your Self-Assessment tax return or ask HM Revenue and Customs to adjust your tax code

So what is Gift Aid?

Gift Aid is an income tax relief designed to benefit charities and Community Amateur Sports Clubs (CASC). If you're a UK taxpayer, **Gift Aid** increases the value of your charity donations by 25% because the charity can reclaim the basic tax rate on your **gift** at no extra cost.

How do I give via Gift Aid?

Just make a donation! Sign the Gift Aid declaration on the opposite page of this leaflet. If you donate cash, please use an envelope and put your name on it so we can claim the tax back.

I want an easy way to give regularly

Just pay by Standing order - a form to complete is on the back of this leaflet, which we will forward to your bank.

Are there any limits to what I can give?

None at all!!! But remember, in each tax year, you must pay as much income or capital gains tax as we will claim back. We can remind you of your total giving if you ask.

Does it matter if I have a joint account?

No. The gift aid declaration has a section for you to declare that it is your money you are giving - please sign it. The person who makes the declaration should sign the cheques or standing order form. Spouses or people living at the same address can make a joint declaration (in effect, two or more declarations on the same form). The details of each donor must be included, and joint donations will be split equally between the donors unless otherwise instructed. It is not required that all donors sign the form. Where requested, one signature will suffice.

What if I pay a higher rate of tax?

People who pay a higher tax rate can get extra relief on their donations by writing to their tax office or declaring it on their tax return.

What if I am self-employed?

Start with the total amount you want to give this tax year. Divide it by 80 and then multiply it by 100. This gives you the gross (before tax) value of your giving. Will you pay income tax or capital gains tax on at least that amount of your income over the year? If so, you can safely give that amount.
